

The Cromford Road Christmas Festival (see the photos later in this magazine) was a great success. The wide variety of stalls and entertainments attracted people not only from our own Parish but from farther afield too. It is really good to see the way that the Cromford Road end of our Parish has been transformed over the past few years with the introduction of quality retail businesses.

And not only on Cromford Road are things looking good for we seem to be moving from strength to strength in our Parish. As Chairman of the Council, I was recently invited to cut the tape to open the new Esso Garage on Derby Road. I hope it is not too late to wish you all a very happy and prosperous new year. I think we all agree that the Parish Council did a wonderful job with their Christmas decorations and Carol Concert. Well done.

However, the new year was tinged with the sad news of the closure of Leaderflush. At the time of writing we are hopeful that a buyer can be found for the business, but in the meantime the County Council are working with the Borough Council and Job Centre Plus about supporting those workers made redundant.

It was pleasing to see the new Heanor Library open early in December and I think we will all agree it is a very fine building

The County Council have recently introduced to the growing list of trades offered financial advice and currently have 12 companies signed up to this category. These Trusted Traders are able to provide tailored advice to older people wanting help with matters like care fees, pensions and investments. For more information about free financial advice available you can contact the County Council on tel: 01629 532451. I would strongly advise our more senior readers to take advantage of this opportunity.

From 2 January you will be able to exchange unwanted electrical goods for a golden ticket giving you the opportunity to win one of 15 £100 cash prizes. From hair-dryers to hedge-trimmers and toasters to TVs, there's a range of household appliances you can take to your local recycling centres.

We're launching a new youth grants scheme with young people making the decisions about where money is spent. Projects around the county which provide activities for young people will be able to apply for a share of £50,000. Details are available by contacting the Council either via the website at 'Something to Say' section of the YouThinc website or telephoning the Council direct.

The Prime Minister has suggested that the County Council increase the Council Tax by 2% to compensate for the loss of government funding to Adult Social Care, unfortunately this would raise only £5m against the £20m per year needed and so the Council is still looking at ways of making savings which will involve reducing the services it provides to residents.

Finally I was pleased to attend a presentation at Heanor Fire Station to the staff in recognition of them raising the most money in the East Midlands area for the firefighters charity.

What's In A Name?

In another of our occasional looks at how things in the Parish got their names, we'll focus this time on Cromford Road. Now, I suppose it is a bit obvious that the reason it's called Cromford Road is because it leads to Cromford - but fortunately there is a bit more to it than that. Indeed, it was actually an Act of Parliament in 1766 that probably led to the adoption of the name.

The 'road' certainly existed well before 1766 and in its earliest form was probably no more than a muddy track leading from the bridge over river Erewash at Langley Mill to the Norman castle at Codnor. The present bridge over the Erewash at Langley Mill (nr. McDonald's) was built around 1830, but it is likely that earlier bridges would have stood at or around the same point for centuries before. We know, for instance, that there was a bridge there or thereabouts in 1310 and probably a less substantial one there as early 1204.

Anyway, it was in 1766 that an Act of Parliament was passed allowing the establishment of a second turnpike road through Langley Mill. (The first, the Mansfield to Derby turnpike, had been approved two years earlier.) A turnpike road is a road where the controlling body is allowed to collect tolls from users for the maintenance of the highway.

Once the new Langley Mill to Cromford turnpike was completed it became well-used by mail and other coaches on their journeys between

Manchester, Buxton, Nottingham and points in between. Then, when Richard Arkright opened a cotton mill at Cromford in 1771, it provided a useful link between the textile centres of Cromford and Nottingham bringing even more traffic through Langley Mill. This would have continued until after the Cromford Canal, was opened in August 1794.

There was a toll house for collecting tolls near to where the kitchen shop now stands opposite McDonald's (long demolished) and another (which can still be seen) on Aldercar Lane.

So there you have it, Cromford Road is called Cromford Road because of a 1766 Act of Parliament no less.




Christmas Lights

The Pentrich Revolution Bicentenary

Plans are well under way to hold a year-long commemoration of the revolution's bicentenary in 2017.

The events and activities planned include:

- Old and new books on the revolution will be reprinted and released.
- Paintings depicting scenes from the revolt have been produced.
- We have created fourteen walks in the area of the original march along with a walk in the area of Australia where some of the men were transported to and then settled in.
- There will be local exhibitions of information at community events and venues
- We are planning a one-off weekend of commemoration events, with entertainment on the weekend of the original march.
- Descendants of the revolutionaries will be invited from across the world.
- We will develop a range of literature for the commemorations, including leaflets and flyers, and pamphlets for historical walks.
- We will target local schools, providing them with balanced resources on England's last armed rebellion and encourage the children to take part in commemorations.
- · Education outreach will include plays, poetry, re-enactment and music.

Community Connections HORTICULTURAL SHOW




