I am pleased to be able to inform you that our Children's Centre on Bailey Brook Drive is NOT one of those which has been identified for closure. I was able to make the County Council realise that this was a valued resource within our community and its loss would have a detrimental effect. Thankfully they agreed with me.

A small area of Langley Mill and Aldercar has been chosen to be part of the *Thriving Communities* project.

Local communities have a lot of informal networks, groups and organisations who do a really good job in supporting people in tough times. But, sometimes help from organisations doesn't get to the right people at the right time and in other cases things should have been done much earlier to stop problems arising.



Thriving Communities is about working alongside local people, groups and organisations in this part of Langley Mill and Aldercar to explore new ways to help support local people. We want to look at how public services could work differently or do things in new ways to make sure they better support local families and communities.

I've been out and about in the local community talking to local residents. There are some really positive ideas coming forward. We want to build on these and encourage people who aren't involved at the moment to take part. By working together, we can make sure that the area is a positive place to live and support is there when people need it.

We have been trying out the *Thriving Communities* way of working in other parts of Derbyshire and it is beginning

to show real success, so we are confident that we can make a positive impact."

Over the next few months the project will focus on:

- Meeting local people and local groups to understand more about day to day life and getting a feel of what's good.
- Developing 'Team Langley Mill and Aldercar' a group of people who work together to help support people.

Community Priorities Programme

In addition, the County Council has identified areas within the Aldercar & Langley Mill area that will be eligible for a part of our community support fund.

The Communities Priorities Programme allows County Councillors to apply for funding for projects within their areas which would benefit most from financial support.

Projects would need to meet strict criteria and be based in communities where Government research shows the level of need is highest.

Examples of the type of activity which could be eligible for support include:

- buying tools and equipment to support activities such as developing a community garden which could also be loaned or shared with other groups for community events
- renovating community buildings which result in increased local use
- setting up community-based sustainable eating projects
- covering start-up costs for new groups such as residents' associations
- funding training activities to encourage more people to volunteer.
- The scheme would run for two years and councillors would be asked to identify proposals for their allocated spend by the end of July this year.

Areas that would be eligible to benefit would be identified using the English Indices of Deprivation 2015 and the funding allocated to each area would be calculated using a sliding scale according to the level of local need.


All successful projects would need to meet strict criteria including:

- show how local people have helped to design or plan the activity
- support the county council's ongoing work to build thriving communities
- show how the activity and its benefits can be sustained beyond initial funding
- meet an identified need and be delivered within agreed timescales
- show what difference is being made.

Projects ineligible for *Community Priorities Programme* funding would include those which promote religious or political beliefs, involve buying land or buildings or have already benefited from funding from us.

CHIP SHOPS

Thinking of the fast food outlets in Langley Mill, i.e. KFC, MacDonald's, etc., you might think they're a modern phenomenon, but actually the village had its fair share of fast food shops in the form of chip shops and one café around fifty years ago.

Marshall's had a two table café next to Bill Phillips' bike shop, which at that time was situated where the MacDonald's restaurant now stands.

There were also four chip shops in Langley Mill; Teather's operated from a wooden hut on Parliament Square which is now the site of the Council car park off Cromford Road. Coincidentally, the above mentioned Bill Phillips later moved his bike shop into the same wooden hut after Teather's had moved out.

Then there was Hodgkinson's on Bank Street, looking down Campbell Street. He was assisted bv Arward who. despite beina disabled. regularly came to watch us boys play football, cricket, stick and peggy, etc. on the Queen Street recreation ground.

The next one on the list is still a chip shop to this day, situated on Station Road it was, in the past, run by Hopewell's, but

nowadays is known as the New Taste House.

The final chip shop I can recall was Langley Mill's answer to 'Open All Hours'. It was a general store come chip chop situated on Peel Street and run by Ernie. If Ernie had had a brown smock coat, a moustache and could say 'Granville, fetch yer cloth' it would have been an almost perfect copy of Arkwright's corner shop.



PENTRICH REVOLUTION BICENTENARY



LANGLEY MILL'S PART IN THE STORY

On the 10th June 1817, at 6am, the landlady of The Junction Navigation Inn at Langley Mill, Mrs Ann Goodman, wife of the licensee suddenly found herself confronted by several hundred thirsty men. They told her they meant no harm, were only sticking up for their rights and asked if could they have some ale?

The men had no sooner drunk their beer and set off in the direction of Nottingham, when a group came back with a wounded man.

Mrs. Goodman was informed that he had accidentally been shot and someone asked her to fetch a doctor. Another man then arrived - it was James Hill of South Wingfield - saying he felt faint because he was the man who'd done the shooting. He had been forced to carry a gun, he said, and it had gone off by mistake.

The victim was unlucky. Samuel Davenport, an Eastwood surgeon, was called by George Weightman who asked him to attend to a man.

Davenport arrived at the place where the wounded man, Charles Walters, the nephew of George Turner of Pentrich Lane End, was lying with a wound in his thigh. Once told that the men were going to affect a revolution he hurried home without tending the patient. James Turner rode back to Pentrich on Booth's pony to fetch a cart to carry him home; fortunately, Charles Walters did recover.

N.B. The Junction Navigation Inn named above is nowadays The Great Northern.



LANGLEY MILL UNITED CRICKET CLUB



It is with great sadness and a heavy heart, that we announce the passing of former Captain and team mate, Jeffrey Wharton. Jeff, or 'Jiff' as he was known in the game, was an extremely talented bowler who played an integral part in the Millers journey to Division 2. Although a fierce competitor on the pitch, Jeff was also known for his smile, laid back attitude and humour that could turn any tense situation into a moment of laughter.

Jeff arrived in the UK in 2005 where he played for Stainsby for 3 seasons, taking 112 wickets and scoring just shy of 1000 runs. Jeff helped

them to the League Division 2 South title in 2007. Mark Greaves remembers about when Jeff arrived over here, 'Jeff settled in like he had been playing all his life at Stainsby. He was a talented cricketer and one of the most genuine blokes to have played for Stainsby Hall Cricket Club. I recall batting with him against South Wingfield in 2005 and he ran them ragged running singles that simply did not exist. Jeff will never be forgotten at Stainsby Hall Cricket Club'.

Jeff went on to join Glapwell in the 2008 season, playing for two seasons and taking a total of 63 wickets at an average of 23.14. Former team mate Dean Graney has written a few lines below about Jeff's time at Glapwell.

'Jeff was a well-liked character, very much a team player and a genuine worker while on the field, never afraid to take the ball and give it his best shot'.

He topped the Bassetlaw & District Cricket League Championship bowling averages in 2008 with 33 wickets at 16.97. The season also saw Jeff's best bowling figures for Glapwell, 7 for 8 including a hat trick away at Waleswood CC where he was absolutely unplayable and helped to bowl them out for 35!

Jeff enjoyed the banter during games, a bit of traditional 'Aussie' sledging, but at the end was always there with a handshake and congratulations to the opposition if they'd

won, swilled down with a beer or two!

On one occasion after practice, Jeff was first to the bar trying a few bottles of Brothers Pear cider that was a new addition to our bar. He told us on the following Saturday he'd had to pull over at the services and sort himself out, not realising it was 7% proof!"

Jeff moved to Langley Mill in 2010 where he played for four seasons until his return home to Queensland, Australia, where Jeff, Leanne and Bethany set up home and had a son called Joey.

During his 4 years at Langley Mill Jeff took 153 wickets and scored just over 1000 runs, including 5 fifties, he was a key player during their rise to Division 2 in 2011.

During his last season with the Millers Jeff was the captain and helped the Millers maintain their Division 2 status. Former captain and team mate Andrew Bailey recalls a couple of special days for Jeff with the bat and ball. Jeff's best bowling figures for the Millers were 6-13 in which he was unplayable; one opposition player was bowled and said 'What have I done wrong?' Jeff just ran past him and said, 'Too good for you mate' in typical Aussie style! The other memorable day was with the bat, Jeff scored 94 in just 53 balls which included 9x4 and 6x6. Jeff needed to be away by just gone 5pm so I said, 'Open the batting, then we won't miss you later on if required'. As much as he tried to get out, it just kept going further and the Alrewas team was shell shocked when we knocked 243 off in 36 overs!



In all Jeffrey took an impressive 342 wickets at an average of 22 with best bowling figures of 7 for 8 and scored 2550 runs with his highest of 94 during his 9 seasons in the UK.

During a recent cup game at Langley Mill a minute's silence was held in memory of Jeff, with many people who knew him or played with him attending.

We offer our condolences to his family in the UK and also back home in Australia at this truly tragic time.



LANGLEY MILL COE INFANT SCHOOL AND NURSERY

Well, we are drawing to the end of another very busy and exciting year in our wonderful little school and what a fun-filled, action packed year it has been!

Starting in September we welcomed our 42 new starters into the Reception classes with lots of visits and courses for parents to ensure the children settled well into their first year of full time schooling. They've all worked so hard and are looking forward to moving into Year 1 next year.

Our contribution to the well dressing event at St John's was once again well received as we portrayed our school in mosaics under the theme of 'The History of Langley Mill'. After this we have continued to visit our local churches each term, making Christingles, walking through the Easter Story and presenting our Year 2 children with their leavers Bibles.

Charity fundraisers have featured highly throughout the year as pupils, staff, parents and governors raised money for those less fortunate than themselves. Our cake stall in aid of MacMillan Cancer research sold out of goods very quickly, due to our talented staff and parent bakers, and our superhero themed day raised lots of money for Children in Need as well as being lots of fun! Our annual Valentine's fundraiser, with a love themed red and pink concert, raised over a hundred pounds for Headcase Cancer Trust in memory of Mrs Speirs, an ex-teacher of our school who sadly passed away a few years ago. This certainly put us all in the mood for love as well as serving as a reminder of a much loved lady and her impact on our school community. Our year of raising money finished with a donation to Sports Relief from our Spring Fayre collection.



Our focus on literacy has remained a priority this year, with National Poetry Days celebrated in October (Light) and March (Spring) and National World Book day in March. The children loved reciting poems to their peers and creating stories for the creative Magic Keys they had made at home. The Ofsted Inspector commented that this event created a real 'buzz' about books and reading and writing in our school when she inspected in March of this year, giving us an overall 'good' judgement.



Sport has featured heavily throughout the year and selected children have attended a number of sporting competitions with dance platforms each term, athletics and invasion games in the autumn, striking and gymnastics events in the spring term, football tournaments in the summer and an 'ACES' day in May (All Children Exercising Simultaneously). All children will get to showcase their physical talents in our end of year competitive Sports' Day which is always a fantastic event, with crowning of the best Year 2 high jumper as the grand finale!

Our concerts have as always have been highly praised and this year was no exception. Our collection event for the Langley Mill food bank coincided with our autumn Harvest Festival and the children loved telling their parents all about the harvesting time of year through songs, dances, poems and stories. In the Spring, our Easter Concert was packed to the rafters and everyone was amazed at the entries into this year's 'Easter in a Shoebox' competition. What a creative group of children, parents and staff we have! And our Spring Fayre, with hook-a-duck, cakes, tombolas, spring crafts, planting sunflowers, refreshments and gifts ended a super term. Christmas was, as always, a special time of year, with a wonderful Nursery ABC nativity and school Christmas concert based around winter flowers. We even had parents of children who have now left the school returning to spectate as our concert is renowned for being a spectacular event!

Anti-bullying work has been a thread running through all areas of school life all year and our annual Anti-bullying week in November began a year of 'bucket filling' events. The children have learned lots about how they treat people and make them feel by filling their invisible buckets (and not dipping into them!). Renewal of the Derbyshire County Council Anti-bullying STOP award in March confirmed our quality and effective work around anti-bullying.

LET THERE BE LIGHT! - EVENTUALLY

It's been a long time coming, but after first being reported in this magazine as a project in progress in February of 2014, I am pleased to report that the promised lamp standards along the resurfaced Pottery Lane footpath have now been installed.

Foot passengers can now walk the length of the pathway, both pre-dawn and post-dusk, with their way illuminated.

The footpath has not yet been officially adopted and until it is the Parish Council will pick up the bill for the running cost of the lights which is anticipated to be around £1,500 per annum.

Pottery Lane runs between Station Road, opposite its junction with Milnhay Road, to the railway footbridge that connects to North Street. The pathway also runs on past the footbridge to give access to Bridge Street and the Queen Street recreation ground. Its name comes from the fact that it used to run along the side of Langley Mill Pottery.
